Eileen Walkenstein, a native of Philadelphia, received her M.D. degree at Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania, trained in Psychiatry at the Veterans Administration Hospital in the Bronx and in Child Psychiatry at the Jewish Board of Guardians in New York City. Eileen is a member of the Executive Council of the American Academy of Psychotherapists.

In discussing her new book, BEYOND THE COUCH, she states: "I am tactless, straightforward, and non-dainty in my language. The book is a vernacular, non-technical expression of my feelings in relation to the de-humanization of the human animal and the processes in America, especially in American medicine, and more particularly in American psychiatry and psychoanalysis, which help create the human vegetable and unplay!"
